Message from the Sheriff

Thank you for spending a few minutes to learn about your McCracken County Sheriff's Office. As a constitutionally elected official, I believe that it is of utmost importance that we know how our government offices function, what resources they provide, and how they serve the community. It is my honor to serve as McCracken County's 47th Sheriff.

In the following pages, you will learn that in terms of calls for service, 2023 was a record year for the MCSO. As an agency, we responded to 41,532 calls for service. This is the most calls for service for us on record. These calls range from collisions to verbal disputes to serious crimes. This is also a

measure of deputies' proactivity in deterring crime and keeping McCracken County residents and visitors safe.

The McCracken County Sheriff's Office has four main functions, by Kentucky statute. We are responsible for service to the courts, property tax collection (not the setting of rates), election duties, and finally law enforcement. Within each responsibility, there are multiple facets which employees navigate daily. In the following pages we will highlight these duties and accomplishments that we believe may be of interest to you.

The majority of the funding for our office comes from taxpayer funds, distributed to the MCSO by the McCracken County Fiscal Court. We know the money we use everyday is your hard earned money and we promise to diligently use it.

In addition to our statutory responsibilities and the record number of calls for service, I am an advocate of frequent and relevant training for all of our employees. We cannot serve our communities if we do not train to become more proficient and more knowledgeable. We were fortunate enough in 2023 to receive an increase in our allotted training budget to allow for more training for employees.

In addition to the training increase in 2023, we also purchased and installed in car cameras in all patrol vehicles, which was available due to a requested increase in our technology budget. These cameras integrate with the deputies' body worn video cameras to provide crucial recordings of interactions and evidence.

As always, thank you for your support of your McCracken County Sheriff's Office. We are always attempting to improve our service to you and as our motto states, we are constantly "Striving for Excellence".

2023 CRIME STATISTICS

McCracken County Sheriff's Office Crime Report

Annually, law enforcement agencies, including the McCracken County Sheriff's Office, report crime data to the FBI. Until 2021, this information was formatted under the Summary Reporting System (SRS), categorizing crimes into Part 1 and Part 2 offenses, with Part 1 crimes considered the most serious.

With the adoption of the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) in 2021, the reporting standards underwent a significant shift. Unlike the previous system, NIBRS offers a more comprehensive approach to crime reporting, capturing detailed information on various aspects of criminal incidents.

The transition to NIBRS allows for a more nuanced understanding of crime trends by providing data on weapon usage in violent offenses, highlighting drug- and


computer-related crimes, distinguishing between attempted and completed offenses, documenting types of injuries per victim, and detailing incident locations and timestamps.

Moreover, NIBRS fills the gaps left by SRS, offering a more complete picture of criminal activity and enabling law enforcement agencies to better address community safety concerns.

The McCracken County Sheriff's Office has been utilizing the NIBRS reporting system, facilitated by the Kentucky State Police, for many years. This system ensures that reported crime data is accurately relayed to the FBI, enhancing the accuracy and effectiveness of crime reporting and analysis.



2023 CRIME STATISTICS



In 2021, Group A reported offenses dropped 15% and Group B offenses dropped 4% from the previous year. The crime rate can be influenced by different factors over the course of a year. Undoubtedly, Covid has had some influence on the rate of crime, but the exact influence may not be determined anytime soon.

MCCRACKEN SHERIFF'S FOUNDATION

In 2023 the McCracken County Sheriff's Foundation purchased an Axon VR system. The system offers realistic simulations of critical incidents that officers may encounter, such as traffic stops, domestic disturbances, active shooter situations, and crisis intervention scenarios. Through virtual reality, officers can experience these situations in a highly realistic manner, allowing them to make decisions, interact with virtual individuals, and practice de-escalation techniques without real-world consequences.

The goal is to enhance decision-making skills, improve situational awareness, and reinforce proper protocols in a way that traditional training methods may not fully provide By using the Axon VR System, law enforcement agencies aim to improve the preparedness and response capabilities of their officers, ultimately leading to better outcomes in real-life encounters and safer communities.

Additionally, the Sheriff's Foundation purchased eleven ballistic helmets for the McCracken County Sheriff's Office Special Services Team.

The McCracken County Sheriff's Foundation is administered through an all-volunteer board of directors that is wholly responsible for determining how donations are spent. Board members are Cory Samsil-Board Chair, Ronnie James-Vice Chair, Tom Clayton-Treasurer, Keith Murt Member.

PATROL DIVISION

The McCracken County Sheriff's Office Patrol Division is dedicated to achieving the following goals and objectives:

Delivering Outstanding Service: Our commitment is to provide

exceptional service to our esteemed community.

Thorough Investigations: Conducting meticulous investigations into criminal activities and documenting findings comprehensively.

Prompt Responses: Ensuring swift responses to both emergency and nonemergency calls, offering assistance to all citizens and visitors, and facilitating referrals to appropriate agencies when necessary.

Dedicated Service

Comprising uniformed deputies who are a visible presence in our community on a daily basis, the Patrol Division diligently patrols county roads, responds to service calls, and assists the public in various capacities. They serve as the frontline of public service, embodying our commitment to protecting and serving McCracken County.

Division Structure

As the largest division within the Sheriff's Office, the Patrol Division boasts a robust team consisting of:

- 26 full-time deputies
- 1 Patrol Lieutenant
- 3 Patrol Sergeants
- + 3 Corporals

Operating on three shifts, our deputies typically work four 10-hour days per week. Additionally, the division is enhanced by three K9 units, strategically assigned to each shift to bolster our capabilities.

Operational Highlights

In the year 2023, the Patrol Division responded to approximately 41,445 calls for service. In addition to call responses, our deputies enforce traffic laws, actively pursue drug offenders, and serve court paperwork. Notable achievements include:

- Nearly 800 collision investigations
- Over 1250 criminal investigations
- More than 2,000 arrests
- Almost 7,000 reports generated

Moreover, the Patrol Division frequently manages situations involving individuals with mental health issues. All patrol deputies are trained in Crisis Intervention Techniques (C.I.T.), allowing them to provide vital support and assistance to community members during crises. Furthermore, our deputies hold various other training certifications, including defensive tactics, firearms proficiency, less lethal weapons, animal abuse, accident reconstruction, and other relevant topics.

The McCracken County Sheriff's Office Patrol Division remains steadfast in its mission to safeguard our community, uphold the law, and provide assistance to those in need, ensuring McCracken County remains a safe and secure place to live, work, and visit.

INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

The General Investigations Unit of the McCracken County Sheriff's Office consists of four detectives, with oversight from Detective Sergeant Benny Kauffman.

Scope of Work:

MCSO detectives handle investigations into virtually all felony crimes reported to the MCSO, as well as certain misdemeanors. On average, each detective manages around 50 open cases simultaneously, covering offenses such as

child abuse, firearm crimes, sexual crimes, burglaries, murders, and other felonies. To ensure swift response, the Sheriff's Office assigns a detective on call 24/7 to address significant or complex crime scenes as needed.

Specialized Training and Expertise:

While detectives are equipped to investigate a broad range of felony crimes, they also pursue specialized training based on their interests and the needs of the community. Each detective primarily focuses on cases within their area of expertise. With advanced training and experience in investigation, interviews, and interrogation techniques, detectives play a critical role in documenting evidence, processing crime scenes, and impacting the prosecution of offenders.

This specialized training is particularly vital in securing convictions for the most serious crimes. Notably, in 2023, several murder investigations led to convictions, including one resulting in a life sentence without parole for a double homicide.

Proactive Approach:

The detectives at the McCracken County Sheriff's Office are proactive in combating crime. In addition to responding to reported crimes, they employ various technologies and techniques to prevent and deter criminal activities. In a notable instance in 2023, multiple burglaries occurred at a storage unit complex. Detectives implemented covert surveillance, resulting in the apprehension of an offender caught in the act.

DRUG UNIT

The Drug Division of the McCracken County Sheriff's Office is spearheaded by Detective Sergeant Jesse Riddle, a 22-year law enforcement veteran renowned for his expertise in investigating illegal drug activities. Under his guidance, the division operates with

perseverance and dedication.

Team Composition:

Assisting Detective Sergeant Riddle are Detective David Clark and Detective Blake Maness, both adept at navigating the complexities of drug-related investigations. Their collective experience and strategic approach enhance the effectiveness of the division's operations.

Collaborative Approach:

The success of the Drug Division hinges on collaborative efforts and strong partnerships forged with other law enforcement agencies.

Operational Demands:

The role within the Drug Division demands unwavering commitment and resilience. Detectives often find themselves working extensive hours, sometimes exceeding 24-hour shifts.

Federal Collaboration:

Detective David Clark's assignment to the DEA Task Force highlights the division's proactive approach to utilizing federal resources. This collaboration not only enhances the division's capabilities but also facilitates substantial cost savings for the McCracken County taxpayers.

Enforcement Highlights:

In 2023, the Drug Division achieved significant milestones in its relentless pursuit of drug traffickers. Notable achievements include:

- In May 2023, detectives conducted multiple undercover operations targeting a local drug trafficker, resulting in the execution of search warrants at two residences.

 Substantial quantities of methamphetamine, cocaine, fentanyl, marijuana, and illicit funds were seized during these operations.
- In a separate investigation, detectives uncovered a methamphetamine distribution network operated by a fugitive from a local correctional facility. The subsequent search yielded a substantial quantity of methamphetamine, along with evidence linking the suspect to previous drug-related offenses.
- In June 2023, detectives executed a series of search warrants that uncovered a significant cache of illicit drugs, firearms, and ammunition at various locations in Paducah. The operation disrupted a major drug trafficking operation and led to the arrest of several individuals involved in the illicit trade.

The diligent efforts of the Drug Division continue to yield tangible results, safeguarding the community from the scourge of illegal drugs and enhancing public safety across McCracken County.

COURTHOUSE SECURITY

One of the vital roles of the McCracken County Sheriff's Office is Courthouse Security

Visitor Management: The courthouse served as a hub of community activity, welcoming a total of 204,773 visitors throughout the year, averaging 17,064 visitors per month.

-Weapons Detection: Upholding security protocols, set by the Chief Circuit Judge the Sheriff's Office detected a total of 2,093 weapons, both inside and outside the courthouse, averaging 174 weapons located per month.



•**Vehicle Inspections:** The Sheriff's Office conducted 4,401 vehicle inspections in 2023, with an average of 367 inspections per month.

- Inmate Transportation: Facilitating the judicial process, the Sheriff's Office transported 4,713 inmates from the jail to the courthouse for court proceedings, averaging 393 inmates transported per month.
- Court Operations: CSO's are present in all court proceedings, despite proactive measures, the Sheriff's Office responded to 28 courtroom/courthouse incidents in 2023. These incidents led to 12 additional arrests or charges and resulted in five injuries to Courthouse Security Office (CSO) staff.



These statistics underscore the Sheriff's Office's commitment to maintaining safety and order within the Courthouse Through diligent operations and swift responses to incidents, the Sheriff's Office continues to uphold its duty to protect and serve McCracken County residents.

On June 24th, 2023, at approximately 1607 hours, Deputy Baldwin and Deputy Parker responded to a single-vehicle (motorcycle) injury collision at Lone Oak Road and Clinton Road. Upon arrival, Deputy Baldwin and Deputy Parker promptly applied a tourniquet to the motorcycle operator. A witness reported that the motorcyclist, riding with a group of other motorcyclists, had turned off Lone Oak Road onto Clinton Road. The motorcyclist lost control at a slight curve, causing the motorcycle to veer off into the grass.

The timely aid provided by Deputy Baldwin and Deputy Parker likely contributed significantly to saving the motorcyclist's life. The application of a tourniquet can be crucial in

stemming severe bleeding, especially in cases of limb injury where rapid blood loss can be life-threatening. The prompt response and effective first aid administered by law enforcement personnel underscore the importance of their training in emergency medical

procedures. In situations like this, quick intervention can make a critical difference in the outcome for the injured party.





In the 2023 McCracken County Sheriff's Annual Report, deputies received commendation for their life-saving interventions with Narcan in four instances of opioid overdose, illustrating the department's aggressive approach to combating the opioid crisis. The report details:

- •March 14: Deputies Latta and Springer assisted a 21-year-old in Lone Oak.
- •May 30: Deputy Bradley responded to a 22-year-old in West Paducah.
- •November 16: Deputies Baldwin and Rushing aided a 30-year-old in Paducah.
- •November 27: Deputies Weldon and Sotomayor provided assistance to a 41-year-old, also in Paducah.

These interventions highlight the lifesaving potential of Naloxone and underscore the indispensable role of law enforcement in managing opioid overdoses.

Detective Sergeant Jesse Riddle retired from the McCracken County Sheriff's Office in 2021 as the Captain of the Drug investigation Division. He returned in 2022 and currently serves as the Sergeant of the Drug investigation Division. His career has spanned almost 23 years and four different Sheriffs. He won the Kentucky Sheriff's Association Deputy of the Year in 2018 and McCracken County Sheriff's Office Deputy of the Year in 2019.

There are very few people in the law enforcement community that can say they have accomplished as much as Jesse. His dedication to McCracken County, the west Kentucky area, and the Sheriff's Office is more than most people can understand. TRAINING

The McCracken County Sheriff's Office maintains an unwavering commitment to continuous training on a range of pertinent topics, ensuring the highest level of preparedness and professionalism among its deputies. This dedication encompasses various areas, including firearms proficiency, de-escalation techniques, defensive tactics, less lethal weapons, and legal knowledge.


The training program within the Sheriff's Office is in addition to the required 40 hours of annual inservice and is meticulously designed to equip deputies with the necessary skills and knowledge to effectively handle diverse and dynamic situations they may encounter in the line of duty. Firearms proficiency training focuses on enhancing marksmanship, weapon handling, and decision-making under pressure, enabling deputies to respond swiftly and accurately when faced with imminent threats.



De-escalation techniques are emphasized to facilitate peaceful resolutions and minimize the need for the use of force whenever possible. Through scenario-based training and role-playing exercises, deputies learn to effectively communicate, assess situations, and employ strategies to defuse tension and resolve conflicts safely.

Defensive tactics training provides deputies with essential skills in close-quarters combat, restraining techniques, and defensive maneuvers to protect themselves and others in physically demanding situations. This training instills confidence and competence in deputies, empowering them to effectively manage confrontational encounters while minimizing the risk of injury.

Training on less lethal weapons, such as tasers and pepper spray, ensures deputies are proficient in their use as alternatives to deadly force when confronting non-compliant or combative individuals. Deputies are trained to assess the level of resistance and select the appropriate less lethal option to gain control of the situation while minimizing the risk of serious injury.

ACCIDENT RECONSTRUCTION TEAM

Motor Vehicle Collisions In the year 2023, the McCracken County Sheriff's Office diligently responded to and meticulously investigated a total of 799 motor vehicle collisions. Regrettably, these incidents resulted in the loss of six lives and left 267 individuals injured on the roadways of McCracken County.

Specialized Investigation Approach The exigencies presented by motor vehicle collisions involving loss of life or severe physical injury necessitate a specialized and methodical investigative approach. This approach is underpinned by a skillset cultivated through rigorous training and hands-on experience.

Collision Reconstruction Team Integral to our investigative endeavors is the Collision Reconstruction Team, comprising four dedicated members. This specialized unit is entrusted with the critical task of responding to collision scenes and employing advanced equipment for precise data collection.

Trimble RS-4 GNSS Device Reconstructionist utilize a Trimble RS-4 GNSS device. This state-of-the-art equipment interfaces with GPS satellites and, when paired with a tablet, facilitates the meticulous capture of specific points at a scene. Subsequently, these data points are seamlessly imported into sophisticated computer software capable of generating intricate 2D and 3D models of the scene, complemented by satellite imaging overlays.

Utilization of Drones Drones serve as invaluable assets in our investigative pursuits. These aerial devices are adept at capturing both photographs and videos of collision scenes, affording a comprehensive 'bird's eye view' perspective. The resultant media is rendered in 4K resolution, ensuring meticulous documentation of critical details.

Gracious Donation from McCracken County Sheriff's Foundation The acquisition of our drone capabilities was made possible through the benevolent contribution of the McCracken County Sheriff's Foundation. In addition to their indispensable role in collision investigations, these drones will also be deployed to document crime scenes and other major incidents, further augmenting our capacity to serve and protect the community with distinction.

SPECIALIZED UNITS

SPECIAL SERVICES TEAM-SST

The MCSO Special Services Team (or SWAT) is a group of volunteers who want to respond to high-risk situations. The SST is comprised of deputies, paramedics, and a physician. The SST is utilized when circumstances dictate that a deputy that trains more frequently and with more tools is necessary. The MCSO typically relies on a matrix to determine whether SST should be utilized in any given situation.

The SST responds to and conducts high risk search warrants, high risk arrest warrants, surveillance on armed individuals, barricaded subjects, and other incidents that require a higher degree of training and specialized tools. Members of SST also routinely assist in the planning of other incidents that may not require the full SST components.

Each member receives an additional intense training program upon joining the team. The team then trains monthly, adhering to guidelines established by the National Tactical Officers Association (NTOA). By adhering to these standards, the team consistently meets recognized benchmarks for evaluation, training and deployment.

Members of the team also receive training from a 3rd party tactical instruction team, covering a wide array of topics tailored to the team's specific needs and requests. These topics are organic to the McCracken County area, including maritime operations. By maintaining standards set by a national association and implementing a 3rd party training
